EVENTS

Treaty Territory

Manitoba Arts Network and our members live and work on Treaty 1, 2, 3, and 5 territories. We acknowledge and appreciate the contributions of the past, present, and future generations of the Anishinaabe (Ojibwe), Cree, Oji-Cree, Dakota, Dene peoples, and the Métis Nation, as well as the Inuit people who have a strong community here in Manitoba. We are committed to developing a stronger relationship toward increased representation of Indigenous peoples in the arts.

After the Assiniboine and Cree First Nations left the region in the 1820s, the Anishinaabe hunted in and moved seasonally through the area on their way to the burial grounds in the Whiteshell. A bison trail ran alongside Steinbach Creek and was used by First Nations people. As more and more settlers arrived, it pushed the Anishnaabe away from their original lands where they hunted, In 1871, the Imperial Crown of Great Britain and Ireland and the Anishinaabe people signed Treaty 1. A parcel of land was given to the Anishnaabe around the Roseau River, where the community of Roseau River Anishinaabe First Nation is now located.

The Ojibwe call themselves "Anishinaabeg," which means the "True People" or the "Original People."

Steinbach is the third-largest city in Manitoba, with a population of 17,806 and the largest community in the Eastman region. Steinbach means "Stony Brook" in High German. Steinbach's stony brook was drained sometime after settlement. Low German-Mennonites named Steinbach in 1874 after a village called Steinbach in the Borosenko colony, Ukraine.

Data from the 2021 Census shows 1,755 Indigenous people are living in Steinbach, making up 9.9 per cent of the total population.

The Manitoba Arts Network sends high-quality exhibitions to rural communities across the province. The Arts Network covers all expenses such as shipping, insurance, packing and crating, signage, didactic labels, and artist fees for a one-month member booking fee of \$150 and \$200 for non-members.

How do artists participate?

Exhibitions are selected on a yearly basis by a jury from an annual call for submission.

A jury selects both emerging and professional artists, presenting a range of media and themes, and features both challenging contemporary work and traditional approaches to art-making through solo, two-person, and group exhibitions.

An average touring season coordinated by MAN yields:

- 4-5 visual arts exhibitions
- 20-25 bookings by over 20 communities in Manitoba, NW Ontario, and North Dakota
- 8 free artist-led workshops for members (dependent on grants)
- Resulting in up to \$15,000 in artist fees throughout the year (dependent on grants)

Weight We Carry

Kristy Janvier

Weight We Carry contemplates healing and explores how we carry so much while gracefully dancing through the transition to motherhood – balancing it all in our day-to-day existence. Kristy Janvier was born and raised in Flin Flon and is of Dene (English River First Nation) and has mixed European descent. At the age of 18, she began working overseas as a professional actress/dancer. After 15 years of working in the entertainment industry with Disney, Kristy returned to Canada relying on her presence/meditation practice to guide her work. She guides her work by structuring performances from



personal story incorporating images, installation, sound recording, and/or video with improvisation influence. In addition to her performance work, Kristy has been sewing beadwork since 2018. Sales from her beadwork, Secret_Life_of_Beads, go towards funding her family's bush cabin, which started in 1934 for future generations. Currently working as the Northern Champion for the ImagiNorthern Project and Uptown Emporium she connects with Northern artists to support their practices and sell their work.

Northern Lights

Hugh Conacher

Using motion capture to document the evanescent beauty of a dancer's movement through time. The image lingers, slowly fading away conveying the body's momentum and elegance like the Northern Lights, dynamic displays of multicoloured luminosity. Hugh Conacher is a lighting and multi-media designer, and a photographer, whose practice is based on live performance. He has collaborated with choreographers, directors, visual artists, and dance & theatre companies



throughout Canada and worldwide, in venues large and small. Selected Canadian artists and companies include the Royal Manitoba Theatre Centre, the Citadel Theatre, Canada's Royal Winnipeg Ballet, the National Arts Centre, Mirvish Productions, QDance, Gearshifting Performance Works, Theatre Projects Manitoba, Freya Björg Olafson and Wanda Koop.

Hugh's love of photography and extreme climates has taken him from the Arctic to the Antarctic to capture the changing beauty of these unique landscapes. His photographic work resides in private collections and has been published worldwide. Hugh is a member of the Associated Designers of Canada and L'Association des professionnels des arts de la scène du Québec.

Unconscious Adaptations

Alana MacDougall

Reflecting on the vulnerability and temporal nature of our bodies and consciousness through abstract qualities of medical imaging, the exhibition explores the psychological impact of the familiar appearing foreign. Alana holds a Bachelor of Fine Art (Honours) from the University of MB and a Master of Fine Art from the Pratt Institute in Brooklyn, New York. She is a multi-disciplinary artist working primarily in drawing and sculpture. She has an active exhibition record and shows in Canada, the United States, and abroad. Her work has earned her several awards, and production grants from the Winnipeg Arts Council and MAC. Since 2018 Alana has taught as a sessional instructor at the University of MB.

She completed her Bachelor of Fine Arts degree with honours from Brandon University in 2018. Jannuska primarily works in oil, acrylic, watercolour, pencil, pen, mixed media, beading, and murals. She has had 8 solo exhibitions and participated in over 30 group exhibitions. Her work is in the MB Provincial Art Collection. Jannuska teaches freelance art workshops in beading, dreamcatchers, painting, drawing, and sweetgrass baskets. She was awarded the 2021 MAC Arts Leader Grant.

He's also a father of four, grandfather to five, a traditional knowledge keeper, respected cultural leader, fluent in Mushkegowuk Cree. After building his own studio in a sea-can out of necessity during the pandemic, Adrian recorded his debut solo album. When The Magic Hits earned nominations at the 2022 JUNO Awards and 2023 Canadian Folk Music Awards. and won Best Music Video from the 47th American Indian Film Festival. Adrian cares deeply about many with first-hand causes, perspective on contaminated water, housing shortages, food insecurity, and mental health and healthcare in the North. He personally lives with many issues that Canadians see in the news. Adrian has a gift for connecting with people through his music and messages, in a heartfelt, honest and authentic way. He is a true inspiration, positive advocate, and genuine talent.



ALLISON LUPTON FOLK Ontario

Allison Lupton hails from the heart of rural Ontario where her love for music took root in church choirs and local sessions. From playing for community dances to soloing with orchestras, Allison has found her voice as a singersongwriter and flutist after more than a quarter century performing in Canada and Along the way abroad. Allison has received accolades from international press as well as her peers at home winning FMO's "Songs The Heart" multiple CFMA nominations including "Traditional Singer of the Year". Allison is now touring her album Words of Love joined by a stellar band. Live shows confirm the depth of talent in a glorious mix of fiddle tunes and songs united by the band's often humorous introductions. Woven through performances are Allison's original songs which fit so perfectly into the cannon of Canadian folk that they could easily be mistaken for traditional numbers. Prior to the Covid-19 Pandemic DCBB has showcased at Folk Music Ontario and has toured Western Canada on numerous occasions.

IAN SHERWOOD

FOLK/TRADITIONAL

Nova Scotia

Guitar, saxophone, huge songwriting and a voice that won him a Canadian Folk Music Award for Contemporary Singer, Ian Sherwood Brings The Light to every stage he stands on. A born story teller and a constant creator, his



music dances the line between folk and pop. His live performances thrive on intimacy. Whether it's a theatre show or large festival stage, his persona is irresistible and completely destroys fourth walls. He recently won a Robert Merritt for Outstanding Original Score for the play "Tompkinsville". He was named Best Male Artist of the Year by the Intl. Acoustic Music Awards and was twice named the Music Nova Scotia Musician Of The Year.



THEATRE Ontario

The audience meets Kirk knitting in front of a huge projection screen. He invites them to grab some yarn and needles from nearby baskets and knit along. He takes them through a few snap shots of his life as an actor, writer, knitter, and (Preacher's Kid). Prompted by the events of 9/11, he knit a huge triptych of tapestries, each 9 ft tall by 5.5 ft wide, designed as stained-glass windows, exploring the commonalities and conflicts of the Abrahamic faiths. What he thought would take 10 months took him 15 years. In a show that is all about knitting and not about knitting at all, Kirk looks at the rise of Islamophobia, anti-Semitism, and fear of 'the other' - but it's also about his journey knitting the tapestries, his artistic path of self-doubt, financial despair, theological questioning, and the value of a loving partner who is willing to be a buttkicking muse. As the showcase ends, Kirk pulls down the screens to reveal the tapestries, inviting the audience to see them up close.



MICAH! CHILDREN'S ENTERTAINMENT Manitoba

Micah! is an 18 year old singer-songwriter, dancer, puppeteer and actor who has toured extensively for nearly a decade with his mom and business partner Madame Diva (alias Jocelyne Baribeau). He has been nominated for Children's Album of the Year at the Canadian Folk Music Awards and the Western Canadian Music Awards and releasing his first SOLO children's album on June 4th, 2023. The show can be offered entirely in French, in English or in a combination of the two languages! The storyline includes a young man waking up and wanting to get out and go play in the neighbourhood, only to find he has many responsibilities accomplish prior to heading out to play with his friends. Micah! jigs and dances within show. encourages children to think about the planet, to be responsible and wows them with growing prop plants! He has been influenced by such great Manitoba artists such as Fred lacques Chénier. Penner and his good friend Al Simmons.



ORONTES GUITARISTS CLASSICAL Syria/BC

The Orontes Guitarists was started in Beirut by a group of Syrian guitarists. Shortly after the Syrian conflict began in 2011, they faced violence in Damascus where they and their families were at risk from extremist groups and often targeted as musicians. They arranged multiple concerts, some of which had to be cancelled at the last minute due to violent incursions. While still in Damascus, the group played a concert with the Syrian National Symphony Orchestra in October 2016. Shortly before the show started. a mortar exploded in the entryway to the opera house. People were injured. Many ran home. But some stayed, and conductor decided the show would go on. Later, the group was encouraged to apply for the Artist Protection Fund, which helps threatened artists continue their work in safe countries. The fund arranged for them to be hosted by the University of Victoria in Canada. Since arriving in Canada, the Orontes have taken their universal message of peace through music to cities across the country.

A-CAPELLA/CLASSICAL

Each tour will feature two Indigenous artists alumni from our RBC emerging artist mentorship program who will perform and be mentored by Gator Beaulieu.

Each performance can range from 80-120 minutes, where each community will receive a participatory arts activity before the concert led by the professional artist.

MAN will be providing poster and social media graphics and run radio ads on NCI radio to help communities spread the word.
